

2012 PROJECTS

BLACKWOOD CREEK RESTORATION + EAGLE ROCK TRAIL

WEST SHORE

RAISED: \$30,100

LEAD AGENCY: California Tahoe Conservancy

THE LOWER BLACKWOOD CREEK and Eagle Rock Restoration Project will restore one of Tahoe's most impaired watersheds and create a spectacular new trail on the lake's west shore, just five miles south of Tahoe City. The project is the final piece of a comprehensive interagency effort to restore the watershed. Blackwood Creek contributes over 1900 tons of fine sediment per year to Lake Tahoe, more per unit of area than any other watershed in the Tahoe Basin. Through a collaborative effort led by the California Tahoe Conservancy, the creek and its riparian areas will be restored, fish and wildlife habitat will be improved, and an interpretive kiosk will be installed. A new trail will also be built to the summit of Eagle

Rock, providing a 20-minute walk to stunning views of nearly all of Lake Tahoe. Camping, picnic tables, restrooms, and beach access are just minutes away at Kaspian Campground and Day Use Area to the north and Sugar Pine Point State Park to the south.

INCLINE / 3RD CREEK RESTORATION

NORTH SHORE

RAISED: **\$10,550**

LEAD AGENCIES: IVGID · US Army Corps of Engineers
· Nevada Division of State Lands

THE THIRD AND INCLINE CREEK watershed is Nevada's highest priority restoration project in Lake Tahoe. It contributes more fine sediment that damages the clarity of Lake Tahoe than any other watershed in Nevada. The first two phases of this collaborative interagency project were completed in 2009 and 2010 by the Incline Village General

Improvement District (IVGID), the US Army Corps of Engineers, and the Nevada Division of State Lands. Portions of Third Creek were restored, culverts were replaced, and new bridges were built. The final phase will include stream restoration improvements on Third Creek from Lakeshore Drive to Lake Tahoe, and on Third and Incline Creeks from Incline Way to State Route 28. To allow for safe, stabilized foot traffic across both creeks, pedestrian bridges and stairs have been included in the project design. The project will significantly improve water quality, improve fish passage, and provide a recreational amenity in the heart of Incline Village.

THE RABE MEADOW BIKE PATH is a key segment of the Lake Tahoe Bikeway, a proposed new bike and pedestrian route around Lake Tahoe. The Bikeway will link communities around the lake, improve air quality, and provide a breathtaking recreational amenity for Tahoe residents and visitors. The 3-mile Rabe Meadow segment will extend from the Nevada/ California border in Stateline, Nevada to Round Hill Pines Resort. This segment will provide a direct connection from the south shore's major tourist and lodging corridor to several residential, shopping, school, and beach areas. The bike path will also include environmentally sensitive design features, including boardwalks over wetland areas, and connections to major transit hubs.

TAHOE BEACHES APP

Looking for a public beach in Tahoe? Now there is an app for that!

THE TAHOE FUND, in partnership with the California Tahoe Conservancy's Tahoe License Plate Program, funded the creation and development of the Tahoe Beaches App to help residents and visitors find their way to more than 50 public beaches around Lake Tahoe. "People are somewhat shocked to learn that there are so many public beaches in Tahoe," said Tahoe Fund CEO Amy Berry. "This app is a great resource that will help spread out beach goers to help lessen environmental impacts." The Lake Tahoe Beaches app uses GPS to help you find nearby beaches and driving directions. You can search for

beaches by beach features, including: Accessibility · Barbecues · Boat Rentals · Campfires · Campsites Nearby · Fishing Nearby · Food Concessions · Group Facilities · Overnight Parking · Paddleboard/Kayak · Jet Ski Rentals · Pets OK · Picnic Tables · Playground · Public Bathrooms · Public Transit Nearby · Shade Available · Showers and Volleyball Courts.

LICENSE PLATE PROGRAM

THE TAHOE FUND WAS AGAIN AWARDED a contract from the California Tahoe Conservancy to help promote the sale and renewal of Tahoe license plates. The fees from plate purchases and renewals go to Tahoe's public environmental agencies, the California Tahoe Conservancy and the Nevada Division of State Lands, to fund hiking and biking trails, and watershed restoration projects around the Basin.

The Tahoe Fund increased awareness of the Tahoe plates with a campaign featuring snow-sports super-

stars, and the popular "Plates for Powder" program that rewards new plate buyers with free lift tickets. New this year, the Tahoe Fund introduced "Plate Spotters" to find and upload photos of current Tahoe plates onto the Tahoe Fund Facebook page. Lucky winners were drawn weekly to win lift tickets as a thank you for their continued support of the Lake. Tahoe Plates can be purchase through the DMV. DOLLAR PROGRAMS


A LITTLE GIFT GOES A LONG WAY. So reads the tagline of the newly launched Green Bucks dollar donation program. In coordination with the Truckee River Watershed Council, the program invites local businesses to add dollar donations on lodging, lift tickets, restaurant bills, and other items to help support environmental efforts of the two organizations. Green Bucks is modeled after other popular dollar donation programs around the nation that are used to raise funding for environmental improvements. Early business support has come from the Lake Tahoe Visitors Authority, Mont Bleu and Squaw Valley/Alpine Meadows. "The organizations receiving the proceeds from the Green Bucks program are outstanding and impactful organizations, and the funds from this program will go directly to help preserve and restore the rivers, lakes and meadows in the region," said Squaw Valley CEO and President Andy Wirth. "It's our hope that our company's broad participation compels and induces other companies in the region to support the Tahoe Fund and the Truckee River Watershed Council through this new program." In addition to Green Bucks, the Tahoe Fund is also the welcome recipient of dollar donations made by guests at Vail Resort's Tahoe properties: Northstar, Heavenly and Kirkwood. In the 2012/13 Fiscal Year, the Tahoe Fund received \$48,847 from these donations.



2012 FOUNDERS CIRCLE DINNER

ON AUGUST 10, 2012 the Tahoe Fund held its 2nd annual Founders Circle Dinner. The theme of the event was croquet, but the stars of the evening were three environmental projects that will improve lake clarity and recreational opportunities in the Tahoe Basin. Guests raised \$55,000 for three environmental improvement projects, in addition to the more than \$120,000 raised by the dinner for the organization. "It was a fabulous night to celebrate Tahoe," said Cindy Gustafson, board member of the Tahoe Fund.

"We are only in our second year, but we are already seeing how powerful it is to connect people's passion for Tahoe with on-the-ground projects that are really going to make a difference." California Governor Jerry Brown and U.S. Senators Dianne Feinstein and Dean Heller were on hand to personally thank the donors for their support of the Tahoe Fund. The dinner was attended by over 200 people at Edgewood Tahoe's historic Friday's Station residence.



OPERATIONAL GRANTS

THE TAHOE FUND received operational grants from the Salesforce.com Foundation and the National Environmental Education Foundation to implement a new donor database and online donation system. The Tahoe Fund again received a resident grant from the Parasol Tahoe Community Foundation to provide office space and access to meeting rooms,
